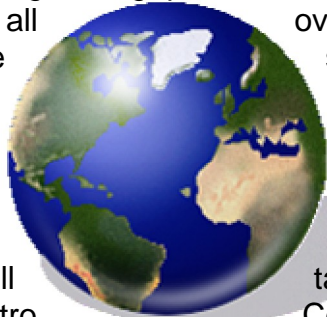

# Section 1

## ABOUT THE CONGRESS

**The World Congress III against Sexual Exploitation of Children and Adolescents** is a meeting taking place from 25-28 November, 2008. Many decision makers from all over the world will come together to find ways to stop the sexual exploitation of children and adolescents. Together they will find solutions and commit to taking actions, so that all children and adolescents can realize their rights to health, safety, protection and freedom from harm.



World Congress III will take place in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil at the RioCentro Conference Centre – the largest convention and exhibition centre in South America.

### **What is the purpose of World Congress III?**

The overall purpose of the meeting is to make decisions on what has to be done to stop sexual exploitation of children and adolescents.

It is also an opportunity for governments, organizations, children and adolescents to learn from each other and to see what has already been done to stop sexual exploitation of children and adolescent, since the last World Congress 2001.

### **What is going to happen during the event?**

The Congress will include workshops, conversation spaces and five panels/themes.

It will be an opportunity to:

- Share success stories from around the world and learn about what is working;
- Identify new challenges in fighting the sexual exploitation of children and adolescents;
- Make new commitments and promises to stop sexual exploitation;
- Find ways to work together and form/strengthen partnerships;
- Set goals on what needs to be done and timelines for achieving those goals (for example: what has to be done, by whom and by when).

### **Who will lead the World Congress III?**

The World Congress will be led by the Government of Brazil and its co-organizers, who are UNICEF, ECPAT and the NGO Group for the Convention on the Rights of the Child.

## The 5 “THEMES” of the World Congress III

There are 5 important ‘themes’ that will be discussed by participants at the World Congress III. Each theme will first be discussed in a panel followed by workshops on each theme. (The workshops will allow for discussions, while the panels will mainly have presentations about the issue.)

### Theme 1

**Existing and new forms of sexual exploitation of children,** including: trafficking in children for sexual exploitation, sexual exploitation of children and adolescents in prostitution, sexual exploitation of children in travel and tourism (for example: adults who travel to sexually exploit children), child sexual abusive images (for example child pornography in newspapers or on the internet) pedophilia and pornography, internet crimes and new technologies (such as sexual exploitation through mobile phones).

### Theme 2

**Legal issues relating to sexual exploitation** means having laws that make it illegal to sexually abuse and exploit children, and having laws that protect children who have been exploited and abused. This theme will also look at how to make sure these laws really work in practice.

### Theme 3

**Making Policies work well together across sectors** means that various government departments at different levels, including the justice system and police, are able to work together to end the sexual exploitation of children and adolescents.

### Theme 4

**The Role of Businesses, Banks and Corporations** means that the private sector is promoting good ways of doing business that helps society and helps to end the sexual exploitation of children and adolescents.

## Theme 5

**Governments, Organizations and Groups working together at the international level** means that various agencies working to end the sexual exploitation of children and adolescents come together to stop cross-border crimes (a child being trafficked from one country to another), to share information and to follow up on the commitments made at previous World Congresses.

### WHAT IS SEXUAL EXPLOITATION?

**Sexual exploitation** of children and adolescents means mistreating, abusing and/or taking advantage of a child or adolescent for personal gains, by involving them in sex work or other sexual activities which are illegal or inappropriate.

### Who will be there? What roles will they have?

130 government delegations and up to 3000 participants, including child adolescent delegates, are expected to attend.

It is expected that 150 children and adolescents from around the world will attend and 150 children and adolescents from Brazil – 300 children and adolescents in total.

850 Non governmental organizations from around the world; 1000 Government/country delegations; 850 government and non government groups from Brazil are also expected to attend.

### Government Representatives

Government representatives are usually the highest ranking representatives attending the Congress.

During the Congress each country will present a report that highlights their work, challenges and successes in addressing the issue of commercial sexual exploitation of children and adolescents. Presentations are expected to be about 10 minutes long.

Government representatives will also participate as expert panelists in thematic roundtables, working groups, workshops, panels and drafting committees (in other words; committees that will write suggestions and recommendations on how to stop sexual exploitation).

## **Non Governmental Organizations**

These participants may be part of the official delegations of government or participate independently. They are encouraged to play an active role as expert panelists in thematic roundtables, working groups, drafting committee, workshops and panels, media contacts and more.

## **Children and Adolescents**

Children and adolescents have been invited to the World Congress to take part as experts on the issue. Children will actively participate as panelists to talk about sexual exploitation in the five thematic panel discussions, workshops and roundtable discussions. They will also participate in the drafting committee (a group that will write suggestions and recommendations on how to stop sexual exploitation) and they will take part in the official Congress press conferences and other media interactions. There will be other events such as exhibits and cultural programs and children will have their own “Adolescent Space” which will be open during the Congress (see section 2 for more details).

## **What will the Congress result in?**

The Congress will result in an “Outcome Document” where the things discussed and promised during the World Congress and during country/regional preparatory processes will be written. It is expected that all governments and agencies at the meeting will follow up on the things written in the outcome document. Children and adolescents will have the opportunity to have a say when this document is being written.

## BACKGROUND INFORMATION

### DID YOU KNOW?

The First World Congress was held in Stockholm, Sweden in 1996. The Second World Congress was held in Yokohama, Japan, in 2001.

### World Congress I

(1996, Stockholm, Sweden)

For the first time leaders, governments, United Nations agencies, Non Governmental Organizations and young people came together for a global meeting on the sexual exploitation of children. 122 countries agreed to change relevant laws, policies, programmes and practices to stop the commercial sexual exploitation

of children and adolescents in all its forms, while protecting the rights of child victims and not further harming them. Governments also committed themselves to actively involve children and adolescents in this process. This commitment is part of what is called the **Stockholm Declaration and Agenda for Action (1996)**.

In the **Stockholm Declaration and Agenda for Action** to end the commercial sexual exploitation of children, 122 countries promised to focus on:

- Coordination and cooperation at regional and international levels,
- Giving education and information to girls and boys, their families and society to prevent commercial sexual exploitation of children,
- Make new laws and strengthen old ones, if they exist, to protect children,
- Help child victims and their families to recover and help them to live safely and comfortably again in their communities,
- Participation of children, including child victims, young people, their families, peers, and others who are potential helpers of children.

17 young people participated in World Congress I. This was the first time young people were invited to participate in this type of global meeting together with governments, Non Governmental Organizations and UN agencies.

## The World Congress II

(Yokohama, Japan in 2001)

Governments, United Nations agencies, Non Governmental Organizations and other organisations reviewed what had been done since the first meeting in 1996. In this second meeting, 161 countries committed to the Stockholm Declaration and Agenda for Action. Children's and adolescent's voices came out very strongly at the World Congress II and concluded with young people coming up with their own Declaration and the Yokohama Youth Appeal.

Nearly 100 young people participated in the World Congress II, including, for the first time, young survivors of commercial sexual exploitation. They played an active role.

### Mid-Term Reviews in 2004-2005

Mid Term Reviews were held in each region throughout 2004 and 2005. Mid Term Reviews help us see what has happened since World Congress I and World Congress II in Stockholm and Yokohama. Governments, Non Governmental Organizations and young people participated in these reviews.

Why is it important to organize World Congresses against the sexual exploitation of children?

- World Congresses are important events that draw international attention to the serious issue of sexual exploitation of children and adolescents.
- These important global events, through their preparation processes at national, regional and international levels create a worldwide movement against the sexual exploitation of children and adolescents.
- World Congresses help governments and the rest of the society in becoming more responsible in addressing the sexual exploitation of children and adolescents.



# Section 2

## OPPORTUNITIES FOR CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS

### **HOW CAN CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENT PARTICIPATE DURING THE CONGRESS?**

What children and adolescents have to share on the issue of sexual exploitation is very important for this meeting. It will affect the discussions and the end result of the meeting.

Children's and adolescent's views and their suggestions will be included in important preparation papers as well as the outcome document of World Congress III.

As in past World Congresses, children and adolescents will be active participants in the meeting. In a special meeting called the Children and Adolescent's Preparatory Forum to be held on 24 and 25 November, children and adolescents will be helped to prepare and to select representatives for the following opportunities:

#### **Workshops and Panels**

Throughout the Congress there will be over 80 different workshops and five panel/thematic discussions. Each one will focus on a different issue or topic related to the sexual exploitation of children and adolescents. Children and adolescents may lead some of these workshops; they may make presentations during the workshop or they may be participants during the workshops.

#### **Opening Session**

The Opening Session of the Congress will take place on November 25, 2008 at 1900h. There will be the opportunity for one boy and one girl to speak during this Opening Session. Other children and adolescents will be invited as participants.

#### **Closing Session**

Scheduled for November 28, 15 00h, the Closing Session will also be an opportunity for one girl and one boy to make a closing speech to the Congress. Other children and adolescents will be invited as participants.

### **Outcome Document**

All of the promises and future plans discussed during the World Congress will be outlined in the “Outcome Document”. The views and opinions of children and adolescents will help to shape this document. But there will also be an opportunity for one boy and one girl (along with some adults) to support the drafting of this document – known as the ‘drafting committee’.

### **Media and Press Conferences**

Throughout the Congress there will be opportunities to engage with the Media and to participate in press conferences. There will be one during both the opening and closing sessions of the Congress. One adolescent will be selected to participate in the opening press conference and one in the closing press conference.

### **Adolescent Space**

This is a physical space which is being created to help children and adolescents share information, plan their activities and organize their participation in the Congress. The environment will be an opportunity to share, display and view items made by young people such as posters, news reports, videos, audios, music, drawings, publications, graffiti and so on.

While you are in Brazil, the Adolescent space will provide access to the internet and different kinds of equipment and various workshops will be provided (for example: training on making videos; using the radio; photography; websites and more). There will also be places to express yourself through art or to find time to relax and play games.

More information about the adolescent space and the workshops that will be provided will be available when you arrive in Rio.

### **Side Events**

Children and adolescents will have the opportunity to participate in various side events, including exhibits, cultural programmes and recreational outings.

### **Follow Up**

Children and adolescents will be able to use the Adolescent Space (described above) to help shape their involvement in what happens after the Congress.

Once [www.stopx.org](http://www.stopx.org) launches, it will replace the blog site, and Viracao's effort will become an important part of the online platform.

**Thematic Meetings:** There have been special meetings on the five themes of the World Congress. Children and adolescents have taken part in some of these meetings.

**World Congresses I and II:** Children and adolescents played an important role in past World Congresses, in 1996 and 2001. Please see Sections 1 and 6 for more details.

Building on these experiences and accomplishments, the World Congress III is preparing for children and adolescent participation in a significant way. A greater number of children and adolescents than ever before will participate as experts, bringing their knowledge of the subject and examples of how to promote the participation of children to end sexual exploitation.

## AFTER THE CONGRESS...

**All of the organizers understand that it is important to also focus on what happens after the Congress. Children and adolescents will help shape the follow up efforts and identify ways of ensuring the work does not end in Rio. All Congress participants will be looking to the future and helping to identify ways of moving forward. Children and adolescents who attend the Congress need to also share their experiences and the decisions/promises made with other children and adolescents back home, so that they can follow up with organizations and governments to make sure they do what they have promised.**



# Section 3

## CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS PREPARATORY FORUM

### **What is the Children's and Adolescent's Preparatory Forum?**

This is a special meeting for children and adolescents who will participate at the World Congress III. It will take place right before the World Congress from 24<sup>th</sup>-25<sup>th</sup> November.

### **What is the purpose of the meeting?**

The main purpose of the meeting is to prepare children and adolescents for the World Congress III, its side events and important media opportunities. The meeting will help children and adolescents to understand more about the Congress, its themes and its structure, so that they can effectively participate and decide upon their final suggestions to make at the Congress. The idea of the meeting is also for children and adolescents to learn more about Brazil, to connect with one another and learn about other cultures and backgrounds.

### **Where will it take place?**

The meeting will take place on 24 and 25 November 2008 at the Hotel Windsor in the neighborhood of Barra in Rio, Brazil.

**More information about the Preparatory Forum and your stay in Rio will be made available to you in a separate communication before you leave for Rio.**

### **What will happen during the meeting?**

During the meeting, children and adolescents will be given a background to the World Congress and its five themes. They will be helped to understand the many and different ways they can participate during the World Congress, such as in panels, discussions, workshops, drafting committees and opening and closing ceremonies. Children and adolescents will develop a method to select/elect among them those participants who will speak on their behalf in these places. They will also together draft recommendations and suggestions that they would like to present to the governments and agencies at the World Congress.

Children and adolescents who would like to interact with the media will be helped to prepare for it. All participants will learn how to use the Adolescent Space to share their voices and concerns.

Above all, this meeting will give children and adolescents a chance to understand each other's cultures and backgrounds and make friends from different parts of the world.

During this meeting, you will also be introduced to the 80 workshops and 5 panels that will take place during the World Congress III. A list of the workshops and panels will be provided so that you can think about which ones you want to attend. Guidance on how to participate in and contribute to these workshops will also be provided when you are in Rio during the Preparatory Forum.

### **Who will take part in the Preparatory Forum?**

#### ***Children and adolescents***

Around 300 children and adolescents will participate in this meeting. Of those, about 150 children and adolescents will come from Brazil and about 150 children and adolescents will come from other countries and regions of the world.

These children and adolescents have been selected through various regional, national and thematic meetings that were held in Africa, East Asia and the Pacific, Europe and Central Asia, Latin America & the Caribbean, North America and South Asia.

#### ***Accompanying adults***

All children will be accompanied by adults, who will be responsible for their safety, wellbeing and effective participation at the World Congress.

#### ***Facilitators***

A group of adult and young facilitators will guide the children and adolescents during the preparatory forum for their effective participation in the World Congress.

*There will also be other adults in the meeting such as translators, documenters and observers.*

## THIS IS THE SUGGESTED AGENDA FOR THE CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENT PREPARATORY FORUM

## **A MESSAGE FROM THE CHILD PROTECTION TEAM**

**We want to make sure that you are safe, and stay safe, so that you can participate fully in the Congress and have an enjoyable trip to Rio. Staying safe relates not only to your physical safety, but also how you feel. There will be many people to help with this.**

**Once you arrive in Rio (during the preparatory meeting if not before) we will talk with you and your chaperones about child protection – what we are doing to keep you safe, and what you can do to keep yourself safe. We will also talk to you about what to do if something happens, and how you can let us know if you are worried about another child or young person, or something an adult is doing.**

**The main person responsible for your safety is your chaperone. Guidelines will be sent to chaperones, but it is a good idea for you to go through them with your chaperone so that you know what they say. In general, the most important thing to remember is that you should keep with your chaperone or let them know where you are going so they can agree with you if it is safe. This is especially important on the journey to Rio, and back home, and when you are at outside sessions at the Congress. In addition to your chaperones, the facilitators will also be there to support you and help with any problems.**

**Another group of people that you will meet at the Congress is the Child Protection Team. This is a group of people who will be there specifically to make sure that everyone is OK. Someone from the Child Protection Team will be on call 24 hours a day, and you will see us in many of the sessions and events. All the members of the Child Protection Team are staying at the same hotel as you. We will be happy to talk with you in person about any concerns you have.**

**What you say to us will be kept confidential unless we feel that it is something so serious that other people need to know. However, we will not speak with anyone else without telling you first. We will also talk through with you, and get your opinions, on what needs to happen in order to make things better.**

**Apart from speaking to us in person, you will be able to reach us by phone, or by leaving a message for us in one of the boxes (which will be clearly marked).**

# Section 5

## TRIP DETAILS

**Before you leave for Rio, you will get a final ‘Before you leave’ letter that will give you all the trip details. Here you will get final information on travel and stay, along with all emergency numbers and practical tips for making your trip to Rio a memorable one.**

**Until you receive this letter, read this section to get an overview of your trip to Rio.**

### HOW TO PREPARE

All children and adolescents participating in the World Congress have some experience, expertise and understanding of the issue of sexual exploitation. For that reason, the hardest part of your preparation is already complete. The Congress will provide you with the opportunity to learn more about the issue, to hear about what is happening in other parts of the world and to share your own expertise and views.

There are a few things you can do to further prepare yourself for the World Congress. Before you arrive in Rio you should:

- Review this document in detail.
- Review any national and/or regional consultations with children in your area.
- Send in all needed forms, as reviewed in Section 4.
- Visit the Congress website and other links provided throughout this document.
- Read the following questions to understand what kind of discussions will take place during the preparatory forum. You should take part in these discussions only if you wish to. Remember, you don’t need to answer these questions right now.

**What are some of the most effective and creative ways to raise awareness against sexual exploitation and protect boys and girls in your country or region?**

**Or, what are the best ways to inform children and adults about sexual exploitation of children?**

**How can children and adolescents be better protected by adults? What can children and adolescents do themselves?**

**Have boys and girls in your country or region been asked how the laws can be improved to better protect children from sexual exploitation? If yes, what have they said?**

**What recommendations/changes would you or children in your country make to these laws?**

**Do the laws in your country do enough to protect victims of sexual exploitation without hurting them more? And if not, what more should be done to improve this situation?**

**How well do the schools, governments, the private sector and NGOs work together? How do you suggest that they can work better together?**

**Think about some examples from your country or region where schools, governments, the private sector and NGOs are doing a good job of working together against sexual exploitation of children?**

**Do these groups listen and actively involve young people in your country or region? How can these groups better involve children in the process? Think about some examples.**

**Do the businesses or industries in your country or region have a programme against sexual exploitation of children? If yes, think about how youth participated, and what were some of the results and lessons learned.**

**What can the hotels and tourist companies do to prevent and stop tourists from sexually exploiting children? What can communities, children and adolescents do?**

## WHAT SHOULD YOU BRING?

Enough clothes for your visit.

Casual dressing is great – don't worry about getting too dressed up – jeans, t-shirts, pants, skirts...etc. whatever you wear to school or on weekends will work.

If you would like to bring something that reflects your country/culture, please do so.



The days are likely to be quite warm but there will be a chance of rain.



### Personal Items

Don't forget a toothbrush and toothpaste. You may also want to bring soap and shampoo and a hairbrush.



A bag to carry things in (daily notebooks, pens, papers...etc.)

Bring some information about the work you have done to address the issue of sexual exploitation. Do you have a report you wrote, pictures of an event in your community, t-shirts, flyers, books, magazines and other materials that might be interesting. Anything will do – bring them so you can share them.

## ABOUT BRAZIL AND RIO DE JANEIRO

### Accommodation

All children and adolescents will stay at the Hotel Windsor in the neighbourhood of Barra in Rio de Janeiro.



### Getting Around

There will be a welcome committee at the airport and at the hotel and transportation between the airport and hotel will take place every 3 hours.

When you arrive at Rio airport, look for the desk with the Congress logo. If your flight is re-routed, seriously delayed or if there are other problems on your way to Rio, go to the information desk at the airport where you land and ask them to call the Rio Airport Information desk where our team will be.

**A special Rio sightseeing trip is also being arranged for you on 23<sup>rd</sup> November.**



### **Congress Location**

The World Congress III will take place at the RIOCENTRO Conference Centre:  
<http://www.riocentro.com.br/>

The Riocentro is located in Barra da Tijuca, an expanding neighbourhood, with large shopping malls, restaurants and beaches. Several routes provide direct access to the Centre from many points in the city.

Main distances:

International Airport - Riocentro: 40 minutes

Santos Dumont Airport - Riocentro: 35 minutes

Jacarepaguá Airport - Riocentro: 8 minutes

During the Congress, buses will travel between the Barra Hotel and the Rio Centro. Breakfast will be taken at the Barra Hotel. Lunch and Dinner will be taken at the Rio Centro Convention Center.

### **Currency**

The Brazilian currency is the Real (R\$); there are 100 centavos in one Real. Coins issued by the government are either bronze for 1 centavo, silver for 5, 10, 25 and 50 centavos and a nickel and bronze coin for R\$1. R\$1, R\$2, R\$5, R\$10, R\$20 R\$50 and R\$100 are the denominations of the notes.

Banks and exchange bureaus charge a commission on exchange transactions, which the visitor should check beforehand. Money changers are obliged by law to display net rates of exchange. Receipt notes must be issued by law; it is advisable to keep these until after leaving the country.

### **Weather and Climate**

Rio de Janeiro has a typical tropical climate, so expect some rain and humidity. Summer (December to March) is hot, with temperatures ranging from 25°C (77°F) to a scorching 40°C (104°F). It can also be quite muggy; there are more rain showers in summer than at other times, but they rarely last long. Winter temperatures range from around 20°C (68°F) to 30°C (86°F).

### **Safety and Security**

As in any city, the key to an uneventful stay is to be aware of your surroundings and to limit the number of items such as passport, cash and valuables you carry on you. The Rio de Janeiro military police and the municipal guard corps have stations and reporting centers and your hotel front desk should always be available for guidance and assistance.

A security desk will be available at the Hotel and the Riocentro during the Congress.

## Health Issues

Yellow Fever - People coming from endemic areas or who have recently traveled in endemic areas have to present their Yellow Fever vaccine certification when they arrive in Brazil. Countries include:

Angola, Argentina, Benin, Bolivia, Brazil, Burkina Faso, Burundi, Cameroon, Central African Republic, Chad, Colombia, Congo, Côte d'Ivoire, Djibouti, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ecuador, Equatorial Guinea, Ethiopia, French Guiana, Gabon, Gambia, Ghana, Guinea, Guinea-Bissau, Guyana, Kenya, Liberia, Mali, Mauritania, Niger, Nigeria, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Rwanda, Sao Tome and Principe, Senegal, Sierra Leone, Somalia, Sudan, Suriname, Tanzania, Togo, Trinidad and Tobago, Uganda, Venezuela or Zambia.

Also, if you plan on visiting any of the following states or regions in Brazil, a Yellow Fever vaccine is advised (Rio is not included in this list):

Acre, Amapá, Amazonas, Federal District, Goiás, Maranhão, Mato Grosso, Mato Grosso do Sul, Minas Gerais, Pará, Rondônia, Roraima, Tocantins, south of Piauí, west and south of Bahia, north of Espírito Santo, northwest of São Paulo, west of Paraná, west of Santa Catarina and west of Rio Grande do Sul.

You must get the yellow fever vaccination 10 days before you travel.

## Visas



People from different countries may require a visa to enter Brazil. Please visit your local consulate to find out if you require a visa. Or visit:

Your passport should be valid for at least another six months after your date of entry into Brazil.

## Language

Portuguese is the official national language, and thus the primary language taught in schools. But English and Spanish are also part of the official high school curriculum.

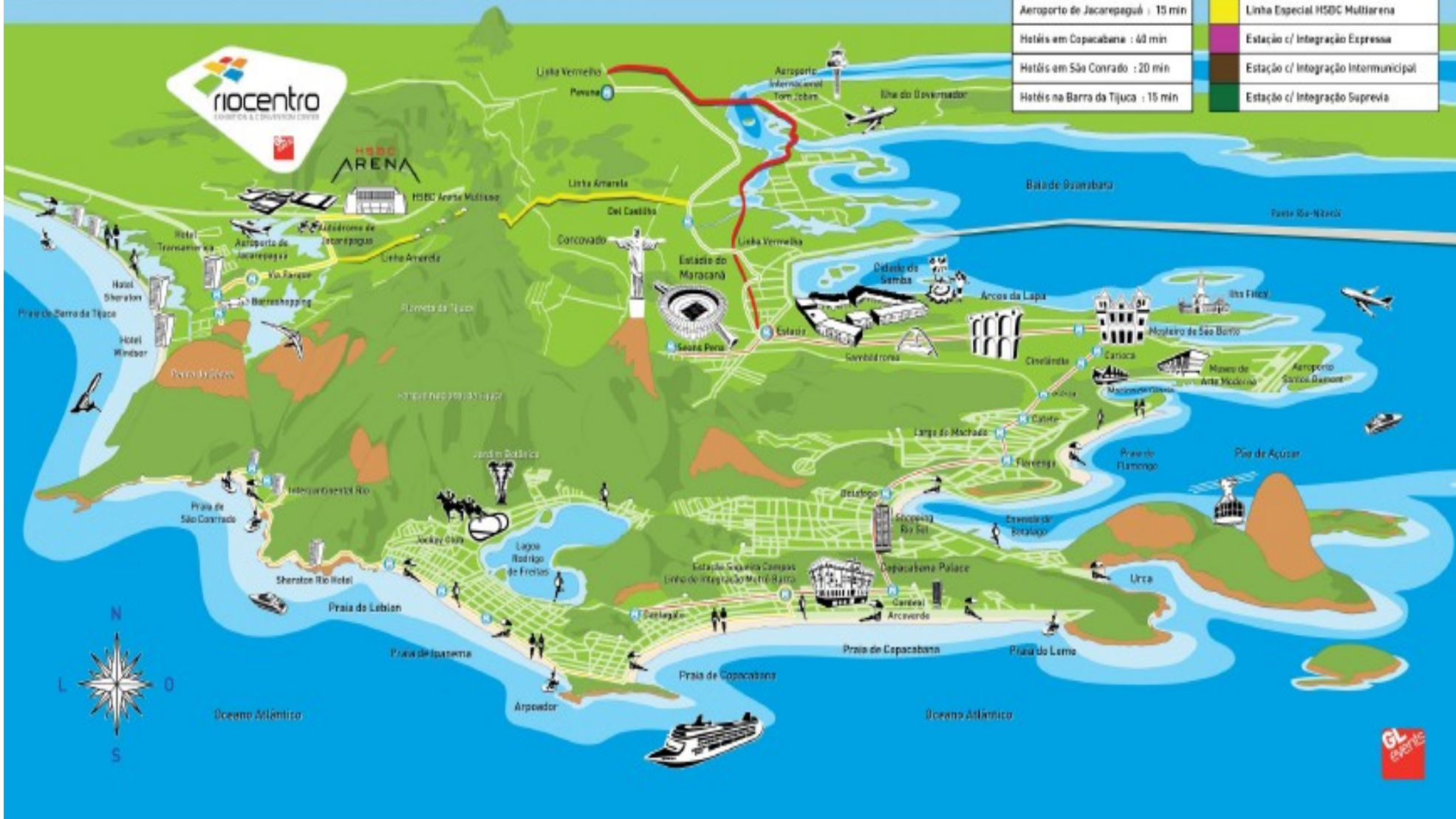

## **MORE ABOUT THE WORLD CONGRESS**

### **THEME PAPERS FOR THE WORLD CONGRESS**

*(for children and adolescents)*

As you already know, there are five themes that will be discussed at the World Congress. These are as follows:

- Theme 1: Existing and New Forms of Sexual Exploitation of Children
- Theme 2: Legal Issues relating to Sexual Exploitation
- Theme 3: Making policies work well together across different sectors - such as the police and the justice system
- Theme 4: The Role of Businesses, Banks and Corporations
- Theme 5: Governments, organizations and groups working together at the international level (for example: cross border crimes)

Each theme paper has been prepared in child friendly language and will give you a background to the problem. It will explain the work that is already being done in that area and also what needs to be done to make the situation better. You will also get ideas of solutions that are possible.

### **REGIONAL PREPATORY FORUMS OUTCOME SUMMARIES**

*(by children and adolescents)*

Children and adolescents across of the world have been chosen by their peers in regional meetings to take part in the World Congress. These meetings took place in five regions of the world. These regions are Africa, East Asia and Pacific, Europe and Central Asia, Latin America & the Caribbean and South Asia. A thematic meeting also took place in North America, where children and adolescents actively participated. In all these regional and thematic meetings, children and adolescents gave many suggestions to end sexual exploitation of children. Read what we call the 'outcome summaries' that are available from some of the regions to know what children and adolescents said in each of these meetings.

### **OUTCOME PAPERS FROM WORLD CONGRESS I & WORLD CONGRESS II**

The first World Congress was held in Sweden in 1996. The second World Congress was held in Yokohama, Japan in 2001. In both these meetings, many things were suggested to end sexual exploitation of children. Governments, organizations and corporations agreed to follow many promises. ## **TRAFFICKING IN CHILDREN IN SOUTH ASIA, SUMMARY REPORT**

*(for children and adolescents)*

This is a summary of a study on child trafficking in South Asia. This report looks at laws and government systems for protecting children from trafficking in South Asia. Here you can read examples and stories of actions to support children and prevent trafficking. You will also find here recommendations and suggestions for addressing child trafficking in South Asia, and in general.

## **KNOW YOUR RIGHTS**

### **UNITED NATIONS CONVENTION ON THE RIGHTS OF THE CHILD**

*(for children and adolescents)*

"Rights" are things every child should have or be able to do. All children have the same rights. These rights are listed in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child or UNCRC. Almost every country has agreed to these rights. All the rights are connected to each other, and all are equally important. Read the UNCRC to know your rights.

### **OPTIONAL PROTOCOL TO THE CONVENTION ON THE RIGHTS OF THE CHILD ON THE SALE OF CHILDREN, CHILD PROSTITUTION AND CHILD PORNOGRAPHY, 2000**

*(for children and adolescents)*

This Optional Protocol is a legal document that builds upon the UNCRC. This protocol says that governments must protect the rights of child victims of trafficking, child prostitution and child pornography, child labour and especially the worst forms of child labour. The idea of the protocol is to get countries to come together to stop these crimes and punish criminals who are responsible for this.

There is an information kit available on this, along with a story book.

### **PROTOCOL TO PREVENT, SUPPRESS AND PUNISH TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS, ESPECIALLY WOMEN AND CHILDREN, SUPPLEMENTING THE UNITED NATIONS CONVENTION AGAINST TRANSNATIONAL ORGANISED CRIME, 2000**

*(for children and adolescents)*

This protocol or legal document says that governments should prevent and work to end trafficking in persons. They should protect and help victims of trafficking. It also says that governments of different countries should work together to do this. This protocol is also called the Palermo Protocol.

There is an information kit available on this, along with a story book.

### **'IT'S ABOUT ABILITY': CONVENTION ON THE RIGHTS OF THE PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES**

*(for children and adolescents)*
